Call to Order

Chair Jack Coffman called the meeting to order at 12:30 p.m. After roll call was taken, it was determined that there was a quorum present.

Review and Approval of TPC Minutes

J. Byron Chapman, Jefferson County League of Cities, made a motion to approve the minutes for the February TPC meeting. Aida Copic, TARC, seconded the motion.

Public Comment Period

Public Involvement Report

Greg Burress, KIPDA staff, reported on activities undertaken to engage the public. No action was required.

TARC 2025 Draft Plans

Ozzy Gibson, Alex Posorske, and Aida Copic of TARC discussed the development and options for TARC 2025. There was discussion. No action was required.




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

SUBJECT: KYTC SHIFT 2026 Process

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet recently kicked off the 2026 iteration of their Strategic Highway Investment Formula for Tomorrow (SHIFT) Process. This data-driven project prioritization process occurs every two years and will culminate later this year with the development of KYTC's Draft Recommended Highway Plan in advance of the 2026 Session of the Kentucky General Assembly. MPOs have two primary responsibilities in SHIFT: 1) Sponsoring projects, and 2) Boosting projects.

Project sponsorships are allocated statewide amongst the KYTC District Offices, the MPOs, and ADDs. The KIPDA MPO has been allocated up to 49 project sponsorships. A project in our region must be sponsored by KYTC or by KIPDA for it to be considered for scoring in the SHIFT Process. The 49 MPO sponsorships will be in addition to the 60-70 projects that KYTC District 5 can sponsor across their 8-county district. As has been past precedent, MPO sponsorships will be limited to projects that are in the MTP.

Project sponsorships are due to KYTC by the end of April.

SUBJECT: FY 2026 Call for Studies Recommendation

KIPDA staff will provide a funding recommendation for the FY 2026 Call for Studies. Three applications were submitted requesting a total of \$305,000 federal PL dollars. These applications were presented to the April TTCC and are briefly summarized below. Currently, only \$185,000 is available. KIPDA staff are currently evaluating and scoring the applications and will present a recommendation from KIPDA staff to the TPC.

Clark County

Salem Noble Road & Highway 62 Intersection Study

- Intersection identified by local residents and SS4A Safety Action Plan development process as dangerous and confusing
- The proposed study would continue the evaluation of this intersection in preparation for seeking future design and construction funding
- Funding Request: \$80,000 federal (\$100,000 total)

Shepherdsville

Central Bullitt County Traffic Master Plan

- Study intends to develop a list of potential sidewalk/multimodal improvement projects to improve connection and safety
- Additionally, the study will evaluate options to alleviate congestion including a potential alternative Salt River crossing
- Funding Request: \$100,000 federal (\$125,000 total)







Louisville Metro

Louisville Metro Trucking Network Action Plan

- The Action Plan would clearly identify a network of existing and preferred freight routes, outline freight mobility policies and best practices, and prioritize strategies and actions to manage and optimize the movement of commercial trucks to major industrial areas in Louisville Metro, while enhancing livability in adjacent neighborhoods.
- Funding Request: \$125,000 federal (\$155,000 total)

SUBJECT: FY 2026 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) identifies the transportation planning activities in the metropolitan area for the upcoming fiscal year. It is required to include an in-depth description of the activities, the cost to perform these activities, as well as the sources of funding to be utilized to perform the activities.

The UPWP must be submitted each year to KIPDA's State and Federal transportation planning partners by the end of April. A draft version of the FY 2026 version of the document was submitted to the planning partners in February after TPC approval on February 20th.. Comments have been received from multiple agencies and edits have been made based on those comments.

The Final FY 2026 UPWP will be presented to the committee for their approval.

KIPDA staff will discuss the key updates included in Administrative Modification 23 to the FY 2023-2026 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Connecting Kentuckiana 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP).

Qualifying criteria for administrative modifications include the following actions:

- Correcting minor data entry errors.
- Splitting or combining projects without modifying the original project intent.
- Changing or clarifying elements of a project description (with no change in funding). This change would not alter the original project's intention.
- Moving a project from one funding category to another.
- Shifting the schedule of a project or phase within the years covered by the STIP/TIP (with no impact to fiscal constraint).
- Adding Planning, Design, ROW or Utilities phases to a construction project that is already included in the STIP.
- Updating project cost estimates (within the original project scope and intent) that do not impact fiscal constraint and updating the estimated total project cost in the MTP when applicable.
- Adding projects that are considered "grouped projects" that do not require public review, redemonstration of fiscal constraint, or a conformity determination.

These modifications are presented for your information only. The changes do not affect the fiscal constraint of the TIP or progress of other projects in the program.

Description:	This project will enhance the overall capacity of the Memphis Blue Lick Road and the surrounding area, from Crone Road near the I-65 Interchange to the existing Champions Point S/D, 2+ miles to the west. There are potentially four intersections that must be enhanced (one is an INDOT interchange at I-65); potentially two bridge improvement structures and several small structure crossings that will need to be improved along with the roadway widening for the area. The roadway widening shall include pavement drive lane expansion and improved paved shoulders. Bike paths will also be considered for this project.					
Justification:	This area is experiencing significant growth. To date there are 6 residential developments that have been platted with over 2500 new residential lots already approved and significantly more potential for the area. Vehicle counts in the area were completed in 2013 and ranged from 800-2000 AVD. new vehicle counts were completed in 2023, and the numbers have increased to 8000-9000 AVD at locations along the Memphis Blue Lick corridor. Residents in the area are concerned with the growth occurring and the potential for new growth in the currently undeveloped areas.

Description:	Improvement of the intersection of East Spring Street (a major arterial and gateway into the community with Beharrell Avenue (a collector class roadway).
